### Room 104 (infants) Michelle Garcia





We are on the move in room 104! The babies are starting to pull up on things, crawl and rolling all over the room! Things that move and make noise make great obstacles for them to explore. I will add blocks, tunnels, chairs

etc., to help them problem solve and learn how to move in different ways. They can go over, under, around and through things which can help them to understand how to use their muscles in different ways. This activity will also help with coordination and

balance. Also, we will play a few hide-and-seek games, this will help them to learn problem solving skills. I will place objects in a bucket and have the baby try to find it. This can also help with critical thinking and problem-solving skills as they look for and find the different objects.

### **Room 102 (Young Infants) Sally Dux**

In the middle of a month associated with dreary weather, a day celebrating loving affection shows up on the calendar. Though the infants at Central are too young to understand the concept of Valentine's Day, they are not too young to appreciate smiles, hugs, and



friendly interactions which come their way. When the older children stop to say hello, or when two infants turn toward each other on the floor mat, positive social connections are made. Young children are comforted by loving attention; it encourages their sense of self-worth and wellbeing. We all benefit from a friendly smile, a kind word. Each day can be Valentine's Day if we intentionally encourage the children in our care to share their friendly smiles with each other. The infants at Central will usually smile back and warm your heart.

# Room 101 (Infants/Toddlers) Erin Guthrie & Kerra Wilborn

It's hard being cooped up inside when the weather is cold, rainy, and snowy, especially now that we're becoming so active and mobile, which is why in 101, we're finding lots of games and activities to encourage big body play and gross motor skills! Our friends in 101 are very interested in putting things in boxes and bins- especially ourselves! We are collecting big cardboard boxes of all sorts to climb and hide in, and to push and pull around. We like to climb and explore, so the new climber and slide, giant soft blocks, and our window step give us safe places to practice our newfound climbing skills. Hiding and crawling in cozy spaces is so much fun, and fabric tunnels and popup tents are perfect for exploring and crawling though. Games that incorporate music and dancing use lots of muscles, plus they encourage listening







skills and cooperation! In addition to being a great way to use our energy and combat cabin-fever, these activities are perfect for developing spatial awareness, balance and coordination, muscle control and body awareness, and social skills like taking turns, following safety rules, and sharing!

### Room 107 (Toddlers) Joyce McKelvy & Morgan Wright

This new year has been so much fun already! We have been doing a ton of artsy activities with all our friends. Tuning our fine motor skills by scribbling and coloring with all sorts of art supplies. We have markers, crayons, stamps, and so much more. We're becoming very skilled at holding and maneuvering different art supplies. When we color, we scribble all sorts of lines, swirls and a bunch of dots which are pre-writing skills. Our friends are also becoming pro's at identifying and naming colors and even verbally telling our teachers exactly which color we want, we even have great manners and say "please" and "thank you".

February will bring a whole bunch of new games and activities that involve our creativity and wonderful minds. We can't wait to show off all the beautiful things we create.



#### Room 105 (Toddlers/Twos) Rebecca Clair & Shelby Watz



When we returned from the holiday break, we wondered whether our class would still be interested in dough and cooking, but play dough was the first thing they asked for after they got back from break! So we made two fresh batches of play dough together (chocolate and oatmeal!), taking turns mixing the ingredients together and then watching as a teacher cooked it in our classroom. We noticed that the children seemed particularly interested in cutting the dough, both with plastic pizza cutters and plastic knives, so we have begun introducing blunt plastic butter knives for cutting. We have practiced on soft fruits and vegetables, like bananas, peeled

melon, peeled pineapple, and cucumber, making a fruit salad and often cutting our own produce for snacks.

We also noticed the children continuing their cooking pretend play in the kitchen area, particularly pretending to make pies, so we continued our exploration of dough by making mini apple pies (where we got to try a spiral apple peeler and a pastry cutter for the first time!) and pizza dough.

With each of these cooking activities, the children have become even more

familiar with the basic ingredients of most of doughs (flour, salt, and water) and with the idea that we use both dry ingredients and wet ingredients together to make the dough. They have also explored the different textures of the doughs, noticing that our pie dough was still hard to roll out whereas our play dough and pizza dough were softer and squishier. In the coming weeks we will continue to explore cooking as long as the children show interest, as well as expanding our pretend



play to include a doctors kit and some more accessories for our baby dolls as several children have shown interest in these as well.

#### Room 203 (2's & 3's) Jerri Taylor & Carla Warriner

In 203 we have been working on art for the art show. Pipets are new for the children, interesting, and help strengthen the muscles in their hands. Some children even found that they could put them in their mouth and use their teeth to squeeze them. We also had an unfortunate event with our pet Beta fish, Dory. He passed away during the holiday break. He was 2 ½ years old (about the expected lifespan of a Beta) and had lived a good life at Central. This gave us an opportunity to talk with the children about death and





heaven. We brought in a new Beta and named him Libby. In February, Ms. Carla and Ms. Jerri plan to have a Valentine's Day party with the children. When we asked the children what they planned to do in February, they said, "make rocket ships with glue and glitter," make airplanes that they will fold with paper, "make BIG trains," build with Magna-Tiles, and play games with the Thomas the Train dominoes. The children build and create frequently.

Some of the children are even writing their words in their books! There has been a growing interest in forces and watching the way things move. We will experiment with blowing through straws, using fans, throwing airplanes and more!

Since the beginning of the year the children have shown interest in the ramp that we have in the classroom. They have used balls, wheels, Lego creations and more to explore how items move down. At circle time we have read many books talking about

ramps. One book introduced the term "incline plane" to us. We have also made predictions about items that will roll down a ramp and which ones will not. We talked about how items that are more round will roll easi-

er down the ramp. We also raced cars down the ramp. Each child made a prediction about what car will go the furthest or the fastest. The red car won!! We are looking forward to Valentine's Day by planning our friendship party!
